

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

1. Scope of the journal

Papers may deal with any aspect of tropical ecology, and both those devoted to the results of original research as well as those which form significant reviews will be considered. Generally, papers should not exceed 5000 words of text.

Short Communications, which must not exceed four printed pages in total length, are acceptable. *Notes* up to one page long will also be considered.

Books for review should be sent to the Editor.

2. Preparation and submission of manuscripts

Detailed instructions for the preparation and submission of *Papers*, *Short Communications* and *Notes* are printed at the back of each part of Volume 1 and Part 1 of each subsequent volume. Potential contributors are advised that careful attention to these instructions will greatly assist the Editor and thus speed the processing of their manuscripts.
